**Budgetary Impact Analysis for Executive Order Entitled
“Improving Public Safety and Criminal Justice for Native Americans and
Addressing the Crisis of Missing or Murdered Indigenous People”**

This executive order provides a plan for U.S. Government efforts to improve the safety and well-being of Native Americans, by coordinating law enforcement efforts, including Federal efforts within the Departments of Justice, Interior, and Homeland Security. The executive order provides for the development of strategies to address missing or murdered indigenous persons, support for tribal law enforcement, and the development of a comprehensive plan to support prevention efforts that reduce risk factors for victimization and increase protective factors. Implementing this executive order would have no impact on costs and revenues to the Federal Government. The benefits of this executive order include addressing the crisis of ongoing violence against Native Americans and of missing or murdered indigenous people in particular. Implementing this E.O. would have no impact on mandatory and discretionary obligations and outlays, as well as on revenues to the Federal Government, in the 5-year fiscal period beginning in fiscal year 2022. The agencies anticipated to be impacted by this executive order include the Departments of the Justice, Interior, Homeland Security and Health and Human Services.
