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President Biden's Bipartisan Infrastructure Law is Delivering in Northern Mariana Islands

As of February 2023

The Biden-Harris Administration has hit the ground running to implement the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, and it is already delivering results for the people of Northern Mariana Islands. To date, \$64.4 million in Bipartisan Infrastructure Law funding has been announced and is headed to Northern Mariana Islands with over 6 specific projects identified for funding. Since the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law passed, Northern Mariana Islands will receive approximately \$16 million for transportation to invest in roads, bridges, public transit, ports and airports and roughly \$21 million for clean water. And, as of today, more than 3,000 households across the state are receiving affordable high-speed internet due to the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law. Many more projects will be added in the coming months, as funding opportunities become grant awards and as formula funds become specific projects. By reaching communities all across Northern Mariana Islands – including rural communities and historically underserved populations – the law makes critical investments that will improve lives for the people of the Northern Mariana Islands and position the state for success.

Roads and Bridges: In Northern Mariana Islands, there are 0 bridges and over 0 miles of highway in poor condition. The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law will rebuild our roads and includes the single largest dedicated bridge investment since the construction of the interstate highway system. Based on formula funding alone, Northern Mariana Islands is expected to receive approximately \$24 million over five years in federal funding for highways and bridges.

- Announced funding to date: To date, \$4.6 million has been announced in Northern Mariana Islands for roads, bridges, roadway safety, and major projects. This includes:
 - \$4.6 million in highway formula funding in 2022 and 2023.

\$3.1 million through the RAISE program in 2022 and 2023.

Internet: High-speed internet is necessary for Americans to do their jobs, participate in school, access health care, and stay connected. The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law invests \$65 billion to provide affordable, high-speed internet to every American. Northern Mariana Islands will receive a minimum allocation of at least \$100 million to help ensure high-speed internet coverage across the state. Additionally, experts estimate that as many as 0 households in Northern Mariana Islands are eligible for the Affordable Connectivity Program, which cuts internet bills by up to \$30 per month, or \$75 for households on Tribal lands, and provides a one-time \$100 discount off a connected device. The Biden-Harris Administration is providing further cost savings by working with internet providers to offer high-speed internet plans that are fully covered by the Affordable Connectivity Program — meaning most eligible households can now get high-speed internet without paying a dime.

 Progress to date: To date, about 3,000 households in Northern Mariana Islands are enrolled in the Affordable Connectivity Program, with more signing up every day. Households can check their eligibility, sign up, and find fully covered internet plans at <u>GetInternet.gov</u>.

Water: The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law represents the largest investment in clean drinking water in American history, including the first-ever dedicated federal funding to replace lead service lines and address dangerous PFAS chemicals.

- Announced funding to date: To date, \$21 million has been announced to Northern Mariana Islands to provide clean and safe water across the state and improve water infrastructure. This includes:
 - \$21 million available in fiscal years 2022 and 2023 to provide clean and safe water across the state through the Environmental Protection Agency. Of this funding, \$8.4 million is dedicated to lead pipe and service line replacement, with another \$5.3 million for safe drinking water investments that can also support lead pipe replacement in fiscal year 2022 and 2023.

Public Transit: The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law makes the largest investment in public transit in U.S. history. Based on formula funding alone, Northern Mariana Islands would expect to receive approximately \$7 million over five years under the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law to improve public transit across the state.¹

• Announced funding to date: To date, Northern Mariana Islands has been allocated \$1.5 million to improve public transportation options across the state in fiscal year 2022 and 2023.

Clean Buses: The Bipartisan Infrastructure invests over \$10 billion for clean public transit and school buses. This includes a \$5 billion investment over the next five years to replace existing school buses with zero-emission and low-emission models. Use of clean school buses promotes cleaner air, reduced health risks, especially for children, and reduced greenhouse gas emissions. This year alone, funding from the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law will help double the number of clean public transit buses on America's roads.

Electric Vehicle Charging: The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law invests \$7.5 billion to build the first-ever national network of electric vehicle chargers in the United States and is a critical element of President Biden's plan to address the climate crisis and support domestic manufacturing jobs.

Clean Energy & Power: Power outages cost the U.S. economy more than \$70 billion annually. The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law makes a historic investment to upgrade our power infrastructure by making the grid more resilient and building thousands of miles of new transmission lines to deliver clean, affordable electricity. The law also makes a historic investment in clean energy technologies like advanced nuclear, clean hydrogen, carbon capture, and batteries, as well as a historic \$3.5 billion investment in weatherization to improve energy efficiency of homes and lower energy costs for impacted households by an average of \$372 per year.

- Announced funding to date: To date, approximately \$6.2 million has been allocated to Northern Mariana Islands for clean energy, energy efficiency, and power in 2022 and 2023. This includes:
 - \$914.5,000 for weatherization;
 - \$2.5 million through the State Energy Program;
 - \$1.5 million through the Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grant Program;
 - \$1.2 million to prevent outages and make the power grid more resilient.
 Additional grid funding will be made available in the coming months.

Airports: According to some rankings, no U.S. airports rank in the top 25 of airports worldwide. The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law invests \$25 billion in airports to replace and modernize airport infrastructure, which helps the US become more economically

competitive globally, creates good jobs, and revitalizes and supports more efficient and enhanced traveler experience.

• **Announced funding to date:** To date, Northern Mariana Islands has received approximately \$6 million in 2022 and 2023 for airports.

Ports and Waterways: Like airports, our ports and waterways are in need of repair and investment. The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law invests \$17 billion in port infrastructure to strengthen our supply chains, address maintenance backlogs, and reduce congestion and emissions near ports— ultimately helping our country move goods more quickly and at lower cost.

Resilience: Millions of Americans feel the effects of climate change and extreme weather every day. More frequent hurricanes, wildfires, heat waves, floods, unprecedented power outages, and persistent droughts devastate our communities and threaten our infrastructure. The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law makes a historic investment to bolster our resilience against pressing challenges like impacts of climate change, extreme weather events, and other hazards like cyberattacks.

 Announced funding to date: To date, approximately \$21.4 million has been allocated to Northern Mariana Islands for infrastructure resilience in 2022 and 2023.

Legacy Pollution Cleanup: Across the country, thousands of former industrial, chemical, and energy sites emit harmful pollutants into surrounding communities. These sites pose harms to health, welfare, and economic prosperity — and disproportionately impact communities of color: 26% of Black Americans and 29% of Hispanic Americans live within 3 miles of a Superfund site, a higher percentage than for Americans overall. The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law will deliver the largest investment in tackling legacy pollution in American history by cleaning up Superfund and brownfield sites, reclaiming abandoned mines, and capping orphaned oil and gas wells.

Supplement to Kagman Watershed Plan

Overview: The U.S. Department of Agriculture awarded \$21 million to strengthen safeguards against flooding, enhance irrigation infrastructure, and secure marine habitats in the Kagman watershed. The watershed includes waterways, a reservoir, and an irrigation water delivery system, among other features.

Airport Project Spotlight

Francisco C Ada/Saipan International

Overview: The Department of Transportation awarded nearly \$4 million to Francisco C. Ada/Saipan International Airport to improve the airport. This flexible funding can support projects to modernize infrastructure, improve safety, or address maintenance needs.

Port Infrastructure Project Spotlight

Overview: The US Department of Transportation awarded the Commonwealth Ports Authority a \$3.1 million Rebuilding America Infrastructure with Sustainability and Equity (RAISE) Grant to support panning work for Saipan Harbor Navigation Improvements. This planning project will study potential navigational improvements in the Saipan Harbor, for two potential future projects: 1) the extension of Charlie-1 Dock, and 2) associated dredging to allow larger vessels to dock at the port, including cruise ships and updated liquid bulk vessels. This project will help address the most urgent and systemic safety challenges at the facility by expanding port capacity. It will also boost economic competitiveness by allowing the port to serve additional ferries, cruise ships, and cargo vessels. The effort will consider innovative technologies during the planning and construction phase, such as using locally dredged materials for project construction to reduce costs and reduce the impact on local marine life. The RAISE program is funded by the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law.
