### **Introduction**

President Biden's Investing in America agenda unlocks billions of dollars in opportunity for states, territories, Tribes, and local governments to make a once-in-a-generation investment in infrastructure, clean energy and climate resilience.

Over 90% of the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL)'s historic funding will be deployed by non-federal partners. And the Inflation Reduction Act (IRA) provides state, local, Tribal, territorial and non- governmental partners significant new funding for clean energy, climate mitigation and resilience, agriculture, and conservation-related investments through both grant funding and tax credits.

In the past, too many communities have lacked the resources to apply for and deploy transformative federal funding opportunities. The Biden-Harris Administration's goal is to help state, local, Tribal and territorial governments and other nongovernmental partners navigate, access, and deploy these record resources to build a better America. While there are many programs across the federal government dedicated to technical assistance, navigating the vast landscape of programs and resources can be challenging for communities. To ease this burden, the Biden Administration is committed to closing access gaps and making these opportunities transparent and available through a comprehensive [new technical assistance guide](#).

Governors, Mayors, state, and local leaders all across this country are also committed to closing these gaps and ensuring that their communities are able to access this historic federal funding. That's why we've seen unprecedented funding and leadership at the state and local level for technical assistance programs. To date, over 15 states have over 35 dedicated technical assistance programs.

Additionally, over 15 states have over \$2 billion in non-federal match funding. Those states include: Alaska, Arkansas, Colorado, Idaho, Kansas, Louisiana, Maine, Minnesota, Nebraska, Nevada, North Carolina, North Dakota, Rhode Island, Utah, Vermont, West Virginia, Wyoming.

This guide provides information about the growing number of state programs designed to aid communities in winning funding under BIL and IRA.

Technical assistance can mean different things to different people. For the purposes of this document, we are defining technical assistance as programs, processes, and resources that provide targeted support to a community, region, organization, or other beneficiary to help them access and deploy federal funding to deliver results.

As you go through this guide, it is a good opportunity to think more generally about how you and your community can use funding from BIL and IRA – not to mention the hundreds of other federal financial assistance programs – to take on some of your toughest challenges and create opportunity and prosperity for all of your residents.

Your measure of success shouldn't be the number of applications submitted or even the amount of funding received for your community. Instead, you and your community should focus on how those investments are helping your community and its residents.

Here are some basic steps to help define your approach:

- Build a team in your community to plan for, win funding for and implement critical investments.
- Focus on collaboration across the public, non-profit and civic sectors in your community.
- Across your team and among your partners, clearly define roles to ensure coordination.
- Think about how best to target your efforts to address issues of equity in your community.
- Make sure that you fully understand – and are prepared to execute on – responsibilities and obligations related to federal financial assistance such as environmental reviews and compliance.

The good news is that much of the technical assistance detailed in this guide and the [federal technical assistance guide](#) is designed to help you and your community with each of the steps to this approach.

This technical assistance guide is one tool we are deploying to help make it easier for communities across the country to navigate, access, and deploy infrastructure, climate resilience and clean energy funding. This technical assistance guide builds on the [Bipartisan Infrastructure Law Guidebook](#) and the [Inflation Reduction Act Guidebook](#) to highlight mechanisms that help communities navigate programs and resources from the Investing in America agenda.

The law allows some of the funds to be used by local governments and Tribes for the non-federal match requirements included in BIL and the IRA. From this bill, the Colorado Department of Local Affairs (DOLA) in collaboration with the Office of Economic Development and International Trade (OEDIT) and the Governor’s Office, have created the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) Local Match grant program (LOMA) to be used for local governments and Tribes to support their non-federal match requirement when they are applying directly to the federal government for a BIL or IRA Program. The Department of Local Government (DOLA) is administering the application process for local governments.

The law allows some of the funds to be used for grant writing support and project planning in order to assist state agencies, local governments, and the two federally recognized Tribes located in Colorado in obtaining BIL and IRA funds. Colorado issued an RFP to hire one or more consultants to be on-call for grant writing and technical assistance for project planning (e.g. site assessments, permitting, cost estimating, design assistance, stakeholder engagement). <b><i>Description</i></b>	The Colorado legislature passed and Governor Polis signed SB22-215 and SB23-283 to create the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act Cash Fund to be used to meet non-federal matching funds requirements for BIL- or IRA-funded projects. Approximately \$140 million was appropriated for the purpose of providing match funding for state agency applications for transportation projects; water, environmental and resilience projects; and power, grid and broadband projects. The Cash Funds may only be utilized if the federal funds are awarded. Agencies receiving the Cash Fund awards are required to monitor the usage of the funds and report back to the Governor’s Office. The Governor’s Office is required to report to the legislature quarterly on the use of the funds.

<b><i>Description</i></b>	Capacity has been a longstanding issue impacting many of Colorado’s communities for years. To help meet this need, the State of Colorado allocated \$1.4 million through Senate Bill 22-215 for 14 Regional Grant Navigator (RGN) positions at each of the Councils of Government across the state. The RGN position was established with the goal of providing capacity support to Colorado local governments, special districts and federally recognized tribes seeking BIL and IRA funding opportunities through grant navigation, writing and review, technical support, resource sharing and regional collaboration support. In its first year, the RGNs successfully connected local governments, special districts and tribes with relevant grants, resulting in increased resources and capacity for vital community projects. Their roles have been to develop a thorough understanding of the grant funding opportunities in BIL and IRA, and to assist municipalities, counties, special districts and federally recognized tribes with connecting to funding opportunities from these acts.

<b><i>Description</i></b>	<p>The Grant Assistance Program (GAP) at the University of Delaware is a state-funded initiative created by Governor John Carney to provide free technical grant assistance to local governments for BIL programs and other competitive and formula grant opportunities. While GAP works with all local governments in Delaware, outreach and support are especially focused on local governments that typically lack the resources and capacity to compete for large-scale infrastructure funding opportunities, including rural or underserved communities. The GAP provides local governments with a wide array of services to address capacity challenges, such as, an online funding opportunities portal, a curated list of grant-related resources, training sessions, and workshops. The program also supports local governments through virtual open-office hours and direct appointments. Direct technical support may vary based on the needs of respective local governments. Pre-application assistance includes project identification, prioritization, and development. Application-based assistance ranges from grant research and writing to cost-benefit analysis and proofreading. Finally, GAP provides post-award assistance, such as project implementation support, grant management, and reporting.</p>

The Department may provide a grant up to \$2,000,000 that entails up to a 1:1 match of the applicant’s cash contribution towards the project. The purpose of the GRANT Program is to help local governments and nonprofit entities in Kentucky apply for and match available federal funding from the Inflation Reduction Act, the Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, CHIPS and Science Act, American Rescue Plan Act, and grant programs from 11 federal agencies and the Appalachian Regional Commission that are identifying opportunities for Kentucky through a clearinghouse sponsored by the Interagency Working Group.

As a conduit for infrastructure funds, Maine DOT leadership is encouraging municipalities interested in developing projects to contact their regional planner at Maine DOT. Increasing municipal engagement through the planners will ensure projects are ready for funding and decrease unintentional competition for funds at the Federal level. To take full advantage of these opportunities, Maine DOT aims to coordinate and possibly partner with other eligible applicants on applications. Maine offers planning partnership programs like the Village Partnership Initiative to scope projects for future discretionary grant opportunities.
