Buildings and Facilities	14,500,000	This funding would be used to repair the U.S. Horticultural Research Laboratory in Ft. Pierce, Florida. There was widespread catastrophic damage to 37 bays of the main greenhouse complex, posing safety limitations for employees and regulatory compliance issues for stakeholder-driven, mission-critical research. Due to the severity of the damage, replacement is required for all 37 bays. Similar damage occurred to two greenhouses, two pump stations, and a filtration station at Picos Road Farm. Repair is required for these greenhouses and pump and filtration stations. Similar damage also occurred to greenhouses and a pesticide storage building at Whitmore Farm. Repair is required for one greenhouse and replacement is required for one greenhouse and pesticide storage building due to damage severity.

Operations, Research, and Facilities	10,000,000	This funding would address damage from Hurricanes Helene and Milton to NOAA facilities and partners across several States, including but not limited to roof repair, environmental remediation, and equipment repair and replacement.
Procurement, Acquisition and Construction	100,000,000	This funding would allow NOAA to replace its Beaufort, North Carolina lab and its Pascagoula, Mississippi pier. Both sites experienced hurricane damage, hindering critical NOAA research and operations. The lab is not operable, and pier operations, where NOAA homeports three ships, are extremely limited. Funding would also cover damages to some smaller NOAA assets that experienced damage from Hurricanes Helene and Milton.

Buildings and Facilities	64,795,500	This funding would be used to repair Bureau of Prison facilities damaged by Hurricanes Helene and Milton. This includes roof repairs and replacement, and electrical work at eight facilities located in FL, GA, SC, and VA. It also includes funding to address facility damage caused by Hurricane Laura, and to complete repairs for Federal Correctional Institute Estill in SC which was damaged by a tornado in 2020.

Construction and Environmental Compliance and Restoration	554,000,000	This funding would be used to partially rebuild and restore a NASA satellite communications facility on Guam that was destroyed by Typhoon Mawar to restore communications with key NASA missions. This funding would also be used to repair and rebuild Federal facilities at NASA's Armstrong Flight Research Center in California that were damaged in 2023 by Hurricane Hilary. This funding would also be used to repair and rebuild NASA facilities damaged by disasters occurring in 2024, including: tornadoes in Mississippi that damaged the Stennis Space Center roofs; Hurricane Beryl that caused extensive damage to the Johnson Space Center in Texas; and Hurricane Milton where, in addition to building damage, dunes and offshore areas that protect launch pads at the Kennedy Space Center in Florida were heavily eroded.

Operation and Maintenance, Army	451,894,000	This funding would be used to reimburse the Army for damages at West Point as well as to repair damage to various buildings, infrastructure, and aircraft at Fort Sill and Fort Carson. Funding is also provided for facilities restoration at various locations due to damage from Hurricanes Milton and Helene.
Operation and Maintenance, Navy	1,454,153,000	This funding would be used by the Navy for repair or reimbursement of various structures and facilities damaged by: Typhoon Mawar in Guam; Hurricanes Milton, Helene, Ian, Nicole, and Idalia in Florida; and severe storms in Tennessee.

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Operation and Maintenance, Air Force	912,778,000	This funding would be used by the Air Force for reimbursement or to repair various structures and facilities in Guam damaged by Typhoon Mawar and other facility damage caused by Hurricanes Milton and Helene.
Operation and Maintenance, Space Force	90,230,000	This funding would be used by the Space Force for reimbursement or to repair various structures and facilities in Guam damaged by Typhoon Mawar and to repair other facilities damaged by Hurricanes Milton and Helene.

Activities would include removal of thousands of downed trees from roadways, restoration of downed power lines, and repair of roofs, HVAC systems, windows, fences, and other property.

Operations and Support	23,000,000	This funding would be used to conduct necessary repairs of shore facilities and support environmental remediation projects in the wake of disasters such as Hurricane Helene.

Capital Improvement and Maintenance	3,752,000,000	This funding would be used to repair and rebuild Federal facilities and roads damaged due to Hurricane Helene and other snow, rain, fire, flooding, hurricane, and tornado events throughout the National Forest System.
Forest and Rangeland Research	26,000,000	This funding would be used to re-establish and survey Forest Inventory and Analysis plots damaged as a result of Hurricane Helene.
Forest Service Operations	1,265,000,000	This funding would be used to repair and replace Forest Service radio towers and communication sites damaged as a result of Hurricane Helene.
National Forest System	1,070,000,000	This funding would be used to address impacts to National Forests from Hurricane Helene. This funding would support re-establishing boundary lines, removing hazardous material and waste debris, removing hazard trees, salvaging timber, and conducting vegetation management actions.
State and Private Forestry	101,000,000	This funding would provide technical assistance to local, State, and tribal governments for forest stewardship, urban and community forestry, forest health protection, and State and volunteer fire assistance.

Management of Lands and Resources	76,115,000	This funding would be used to rebuild Federal offices, employee housing, roads, and other assets damaged as a result of flooding, landslides, and mudslides in Alaska.

Construction	581,057,827	This funding would be used to repair and rebuild Federal facilities and roads damaged due to flooding, landslide, and mudslide events caused by severe weather, record snowpack, and spring rain events in California, Colorado, Minnesota, North Dakota, Iowa, Rhode Island, Nevada, and Illinois. This funding would also repair Federal facilities that suffered water damage as a result of Typhoon Mawar in Guam, Hurricane Idalia impacts in Florida and South Carolina, and Hurricane Beryl in Texas. Funding would also repair and rebuild Federal facilities and roads due to recent damages from Hurricanes Helene and Milton in Florida, South Carolina, Tennessee, Illinois, Indiana, Georgia, Kentucky, and Alabama.

Construction	2,262,871,000	This funding would be used to repair and rebuild Federal facilities, roads, and other assets damaged as a result of severe snowstorms in California, fires in Washington State, tornadoes in Oklahoma, and severe storms on the East Coast in particular in Maine, earlier this year. Funding reflects updated estimates to address damages as a result of Hurricane Hilary in California, and recent damages from the Windy Deuce fire in Texas, and Hurricanes Helene and Milton in Florida, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee, and Georgia. The request includes \$1.7 billion for repairs and rebuilding of the Blue Ridge Parkway and associated facilities.

Surveys, Investigations, and Research	2,743,000	This funding would be used to repair or replace streamgages and seismic monitoring stations damaged in Hurricane Helene in Florida, Georgia, North Carolina, South Carolina, and Tennessee and to restore data lost while the streamgages were offline.

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Bureau of Indian Education (BIE) Education Construction	153,000,000	This funding would support the completing construction of the BIE To'Hajiilee Community School affected by severe flooding in 2022 and partially funded in a previous disaster supplemental. The additional resource need is based on construction design estimates made in consultation with the Tribe and updated standard estimates for inflation over the duration of construction.
Departmental Offices Departmental Operations	300,000,000	This funding would support coordinated restoration efforts managed through the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation, which has extensive experience administering Federal emergency funds and can work quickly with their broad partner network of State and local government entities and non-governmental organizations. This funding would also address sustained environmental disaster damages at DOI refuge areas, national parks, and public lands across Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, North Carolina, Indiana, Kentucky, South Carolina, and Tennessee, including the need for habitat restoration and invasive species management efforts.

Environmental Programs and Management	2,360,000	This funding would support EPA's Region 4 Office in managing hazardous materials and debris management grants. These grants would provide vital resources to States for the safe and proper management of the enormous amount of debris generated from Hurricanes Helene and Milton. Managing the grants requires funding for staff to ensure that Federal funding has the greatest impact. Funding would also support EPA's Office of Enforcement and Compliance Assurance to support communications and special agents for public safety and security in the wake of Hurricanes Helene and Milton. Funding would also enable the Office of Air and Radiation to support engagement with public health officials and public health messaging to mitigate air quality impacts and ensure that impacted communities are not further harmed as a result of cleanup efforts.

Storm damage affected navigational, terminal, weather, communication, power, and unstaffed facility assets.
Operations	[4,800,000]	FAA estimates additional overtime, travel, contract support, and parts expenses will be incurred in conjunction with recovery and repair efforts. FAA has balances from prior Hurricanes that could be repurposed to cover these costs. However, legislation is required.
